

Read Proverbs 1

The first seven verses of this chapter describe the contents of the entire book. Its series of instructions gleaned from life assures successful living. The first instruction warns about the dangers of evil companions. This is followed by a speech given by Wisdom personified. Rejecting Wisdom will lead to disaster and unhappiness.

Reflect: We all want to live happy, meaningful lives. Proverbs insists that this can be accomplished only if we discover life's possibilities and dangers and, having discovered them, choose the proper way to live. To do otherwise is to court disaster.

Pray: Pray for the insight to learn the lessons that life has to teach and for the wisdom and humility to follow the path that you uncover.

Act: Reflect on how your life has unfolded so that you can learn the lessons that it has to teach you.

1 The proverbs of Solomon son of David, king of Israel:

Prologue

- ² For learning about wisdom and instruction, for understanding words of insight,
- ³ for gaining instruction in wise dealing, righteousness, justice, and equity;
- 4 to teach shrewdness to the simple, knowledge and prudence to the young—
- 5 let the wise also hear and gain in learning, and the discerning acquire skill,
- 6 to understand a proverb and a figure, the words of the wise and their riddles.
- ⁷ The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction.

Warnings against Evil Companions

- 8 Hear, my child, your father's instruction, and do not reject your mother's teaching;
- 9 for they are a fair garland for your head, and pendants for your neck.
- My child, if sinners entice you, do not consent.
- 11 If they say, "Come with us, let us lie in wait for blood;

let us wantonly ambush the innocent;

- like Sheol let us swallow them alive and whole, like those who go down to the Pit.
- We shall find all kinds of costly things; we shall fill our houses with booty.

PROVERBS 1 968

- Throw in your lot among us; we will all have one purse"—
- 15 my child, do not walk in their way, keep your foot from their paths;
- for their feet run to evil, and they hurry to shed blood.
- For in vain is the net baited while the bird is looking on;
- 18 yet they lie in wait—to kill themselves! and set an ambush—for their own lives!
- 19 Such is the enda of all who are greedy for gain; it takes away the life of its possessors.

The Call of Wisdom

- Wisdom cries out in the street; in the squares she raises her voice.
- ²¹ At the busiest corner she cries out; at the entrance of the city gates she speaks:
- "How long, O simple ones, will you love being simple? How long will scoffers delight in their

scoffing and fools hate knowledge?

- Give heed to my reproof;
 I will pour out my thoughts to you;
 I will make my words known to you.
- ²⁴ Because I have called and you refused.

- have stretched out my hand and no one heeded,
- 25 and because you have ignored all my counsel and would have none of my
 - and would have none of my reproof,
- ²⁶ I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when panic strikes you,
- when panic strikes you like a storm, and your calamity comes like a whirlwind,
 - when distress and anguish come upon you.
- Then they will call upon me, but I will not answer; they will seek me diligently, but
 - will not find me.
- ²⁹ Because they hated knowledge and did not choose the fear of the LORD,
- would have none of my counsel, and despised all my reproof,
- 31 therefore they shall eat the fruit of their way and be sated with their own
 - devices.
- For waywardness kills the simple, and the complacency of fools destroys them;
- but those who listen to me will be secure
 - and will live at ease, without dread of disaster."

The Value of Wisdom

- 2 My child, if you accept my words and treasure up my commandments within you,
 - ² making your ear attentive to wisdom and inclining your heart to understanding;
 - 3 if you indeed cry out for insight, and raise your voice for understanding;
 - ⁴ if you seek it like silver,
 - and search for it as for hidden treasures—
 - 5 then you will understand the fear of the LORD and find the knowledge of God.
 - ⁶ For the LORD gives wisdom; from his mouth come knowledge and understanding;
 - ⁷ he stores up sound wisdom for the upright; he is a shield to those who walk blamelessly,

Read Proverbs 2

In a second instruction, Wisdom speaks of the openness and intelligence needed to acquire wisdom. She then announces some of the benefits of listening to her guidance. Chief among them are understanding and protection from evil. It is clear that these instructions are meant for young men, for the address is "my son," and one of the warnings is against an "adulteress."

Reflect: Unfortunately, many people in today's society value material goods more than wisdom. Eventually they will discover the folly of such distorted priorities. Think of the times when you have acted in such a way.

Pray: Ask God to show you the value of true Wisdom and to grant you an appreciation for the blessings that will come from following her instruction.

Act: Call to mind the genuine satisfaction and deep peace you experienced when you made the right decisions.

- 9 Then you will understand righteousness and justice and equity, every good path;
- for wisdom will come into your heart, and knowledge will be pleasant to your soul;
- prudence will watch over you; and understanding will guard you.
- 12 It will save you from the way of evil, from those who speak perversely,
- who forsake the paths of uprightness to walk in the ways of darkness,
- who rejoice in doing evil and delight in the perverseness of evil;
- those whose paths are crooked, and who are devious in their ways.
- You will be saved from the loose woman, from the adulteress with her smooth words,
- who forsakes the partner of her youth and forgets her sacred covenant;
- ¹⁸ for her way^b leads down to death, and her paths to the shades;
- ¹⁹ those who go to her never come back, nor do they regain the paths of life.
- ²⁰ Therefore walk in the way of the good, and keep to the paths of the just.
- ²¹ For the upright will abide in the land, and the innocent will remain in it:
- 22 but the wicked will be cut off from the land, and the treacherous will be rooted out of it.

Admonition to Trust and Honor God

- My child, do not forget my teaching, but let your heart keep my commandments; for length of days and years of life
 - and abundant welfare they will give you.
 - ³ Do not let loyalty and faithfulness forsake you; bind them around your neck, write them on the tablet of your heart.
 - ⁴ So you will find favor and good repute in the sight of God and of people.
 - 5 Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight.
 - 6 In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths.
 - Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the LORD, and turn away from evil.
 - 8 It will be a healing for your flesh and a refreshment for your body.

PROVERBS 3 970

Read Proverbs 3

This chapter contains instruction on three topics. The first instruction describes the loyalty toward and trust in God that we should foster in our lives. The second outlines once again the blessings that will come from living wisely. The third provides directives for living peaceably with other people.

Reflect: A chief characteristic of real wisdom is the ability to live in right relationship with God, with oneself, and with other people. Living rightly with God is referred to as "fear of the Lord." Living rightly with oneself is authentic maturity and with others is love of neighbor.

Pray: Since we often learn wisdom by trial-and-error, place yourself humbly before God and open yourself trustingly to the guiding insight that God will grant you. Ask for the courage needed to follow that insight.

Act: Practice the Golden Rule by doing unto others as you would have them do unto you.

- 9 Honor the LORD with your substance and with the first fruits of all your produce;
- then your barns will be filled with plenty, and your vats will be bursting with wine.
- My child, do not despise the LORD's discipline or be weary of his reproof,
- for the LORD reproves the one he loves, as a father the son in whom he delights.

The True Wealth

- ¹³ Happy are those who find wisdom, and those who get understanding,
- for her income is better than silver, and her revenue better than gold.
- 15 She is more precious than jewels, and nothing you desire can compare with her.
- Long life is in her right hand; in her left hand are riches and honor.
- ¹⁷ Her ways are ways of pleasantness, and all her paths are peace.
- ¹⁸ She is a tree of life to those who lay hold of her; those who hold her fast are called happy.

God's Wisdom in Creation

- 19 The LORD by wisdom founded the earth; by understanding he established the heavens;
- by his knowledge the deeps broke open, and the clouds drop down the dew.

The True Security

- My child, do not let these escape from your sight: keep sound wisdom and prudence,
- ²² and they will be life for your soul and adornment for your neck.
- 23 Then you will walk on your way securely and your foot will not stumble.
- 24 If you sit down, a you will not be afraid; when you lie down, your sleep will be sweet.
- 25 Do not be afraid of sudden panic, or of the storm that strikes the wicked;
- 26 for the LORD will be your confidence and will keep your foot from being caught.
- 27 Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due,^b
 - when it is in your power to do it.
- 28 Do not say to your neighbor, "Go, and come again,
 - tomorrow I will give it"—when you have it with you.

Read Proverbs 4

A father or teacher instructs his students on the best way to acquire wisdom and on the differences between the manner of life of the wise person and that of the fool. A significant directive states: "The beginning of wisdom is this: Get wisdom." This is another way of saying: "Learn from experience."

Reflect: The wisdom tradition insists that it is reflection on actual life experience rather than the application of religious doctrine that leads to wisdom, and, therefore, to an understanding of God's will in our life. This very important teaching emphasizes the value of human experience itself.

Pray: Ask God to send you reliable guides who will share with you the wisdom they have gleaned from life.

Act: Go out of your way to show respect to those who have shared the wisdom they have learned from life. Let them know that you appreciate their insights.

Parental Advice

Listen, children, to a father's instruction, and be attentive, that you may gain insight;

- 2 for I give you good precepts: do not forsake my teaching.
- ³ When I was a son with my father, tender, and my mother's favorite,
- 4 he taught me, and said to me, "Let your heart hold fast my words; keep my commandments, and live.
- 5 Get wisdom; get insight: do not forget, nor turn away

from the words of my mouth.

- ⁶ Do not forsake her, and she will keep you; love her, and she will guard you.
- ⁷ The beginning of wisdom is this: Get wisdom, and whatever else you get, get insight.
- 8 Prize her highly, and she will exalt you; she will honor you if you embrace her.
- 9 She will place on your head a fair garland; she will bestow on you a beautiful crown."

Admonition to Keep to the Right Path

- ¹⁰ Hear, my child, and accept my words, that the years of your life may be many.
- ¹¹ I have taught you the way of wisdom; I have led you in the paths of uprightness.
- When you walk, your step will not be hampered; and if you run, you will not stumble.
- 13 Keep hold of instruction; do not let go; guard her, for she is your life.
- 14 Do not enter the path of the wicked, and do not walk in the way of evildoers.
- Avoid it; do not go on it; turn away from it and pass on.
- 16 For they cannot sleep unless they have done wrong:
 - they are robbed of sleep unless they have made someone stumble.

PROVERBS 4 972

- ¹⁷ For they eat the bread of wickedness and drink the wine of violence.
- But the path of the righteous is like the light of dawn,
 - which shines brighter and brighter until full day.
- The way of the wicked is like deep darkness;
 - they do not know what they stumble over.
- My child, be attentive to my words; incline your ear to my sayings.
- 21 Do not let them escape from your sight;

keep them within your heart.

- ²² For they are life to those who find them,
 - and healing to all their flesh.
- 23 Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life.
- Put away from you crooked speech, and put devious talk far from you.
- 25 Let your eyes look directly forward, and your gaze be straight before you.
- 26 Keep straight the path of your feet, and all your ways will be sure.
- ²⁷ Do not swerve to the right or to the left;

turn your foot away from evil.

Read Proverbs 5

The teacher warns against various forms of sexual impropriety, namely, interacting with loose women or those who are not constrained by the restrictions of patriarchal society; marital infidelity; and disregard for the marriage bonds of others. These directives both touch on matters of morality and safeguard the integrity of the kinship character of the society.

Reflect: Sexual intimacy not only affects the depths of an individual's identity, but it also establishes a bond that has an effect on society itself. Too frequently the sexual promiscuity of today's society distorts both these factors.

Pray: Thank God for the gift of human sexuality with its energy and joys, and pray for the grace you need to exercise this power in appropriate and life-giving ways.

Act: Discover ways to channel your sexual energy into productive and creative outlets that enhance your own personality and enrich the lives of others.

Warning against Impurity and Infidelity

- My child, be attentive to my wisdom; incline your ear to my understanding,
 - 2 so that you may hold on to prudence, and your lips may guard knowledge.
 - For the lips of a loose^a woman drip honey, and her speech is smoother than oil;
 - 4 but in the end she is bitter as wormwood, sharp as a two-edged sword.
 - Her feet go down to death; her steps follow the path to Sheol.
 - 6 She does not keep straight to the path of life; her ways wander, and she does not know it.
 - 7 And now, my child,^b listen to me, and do not depart from the words of my mouth.
 - 8 Keep your way far from her, and do not go near the door of her house;
 - 9 or you will give your honor to others, and your years to the merciless,
 - and strangers will take their fill of your wealth, and your labors will go to the house of an alien;
 - and at the end of your life you will groan, when your flesh and body are consumed,
 - ¹² and you say, "Oh, how I hated discipline, and my heart despised reproof!
 - ¹³ I did not listen to the voice of my teachers or incline my ear to my instructors.
 - Now I am at the point of utter ruin in the public assembly."
 - Drink water from your own cistern, flowing water from your own well.
 - 16 Should your springs be scattered abroad, streams of water in the streets?

- Let your fountain be blessed, and rejoice in the wife of your youth,

- ²¹ For human ways are under the eyes of the LORD,

Read Proverbs 6

The teacher issues a series of warnings. The student is counseled not to offer himself as surety for another's loan; not to succumb to sloth, but to learn industry from the assiduous ant; not to emulate dishonest people; not to misuse his bodily senses; not to fall victim to adultery.

Reflect: The warnings posed in this chapter are as relevant today as they were at the time of the writing of the book, because the evil inclinations they condemn plague women and men of every age and every culture. It is doubly hard to live a life of integrity when society seems to promote evil inclinations.

Pray: Be constantly vigilant lest you fall victim to your own evil inclinations, and ask God for the strength to stand firm against them.

Act: Use these admonitions to examine your own conscience.

Practical Admonitions

6 My child, if you have given your pledge to your neighbor,

if you have bound yourself to another, a

- My child, keep your father's commandment, and do not forsake your mother's teaching.
- ²¹ Bind them upon your heart always; tie them around your neck.
- When you walk, theya will lead you; when you lie down, theya will watch over you; and when you awake, theya will talk with you.
- For the commandment is a lamp and the teaching a light, and the reproofs of discipline are the way of life,

 - 5 that they may keep you from the loosed woman, from the adulteress with her smooth words.
 - For at the window of my house I looked out through my lattice,
 - 7 and I saw among the simple ones, I observed among the youths, a young man without sense,

Read Proverbs 7

In this warning against adultery, the teacher describes the wiles of the seductive woman. She entices the young man by means of alluring clothing, luxurious surroundings, abundant, delicious food and drink, and the promise of fulfillment of all of his desires. She is experienced in her beguiling ways, while the youth is innocent and inexperienced.

Reflect: We probably know from our own experience that it is easy to be taken in by the charms of another. This is particularly true in matters of the heart. Often emotion and sexual attraction lead us down paths we might not otherwise follow.

Pray: Ask God for the insight needed to understand your very natural sexual attractions and for the wisdom to respond to them in ways that are appropriate.

Act: Examine your sexual inclinations carefully. Admit when they are motivated purely by selfish desire and not love for another.

PROVERBS 8 976

Read Proverbs 8

This chapter contains a description of Wisdom personified as a woman. It opens with her inviting inexperienced youth to enter the place where she dwells and to feast on the riches she offers. Her presence at the beginning and the role she played in creation are described. Having established her primordial importance, now the chapter encourages adherence to her instruction.

Reflect: We can now contrast the loose woman (Dame Folly) and Woman Wisdom. Though they both hold out hope for happiness and fulfillment to the inexperienced, only Wisdom is able to make good on her promises, because she came forth from God. Folly leads to disaster.

Pray: Praise God for the beauty and order evident in creation, and ask God for the grace to be able to distinguish between true Wisdom and Folly.

Act: Reflect on your own experience. Take note of the decisions that have led to peace and well-being.

Read Proverbs 9

The contrast between Woman Wisdom and Dame Folly continues in this comparison of the banquet that each sets out and to which the inexperienced are invited. Wisdom lays out rich wine and succulent meat; Folly offers stolen bread and water. Separating the description of these banquets are adages describing the wise person's willingness and the fool's unwillingness to be taught.

Reflect: The image of a banquet is well chosen. Like food and drink that nourish the body, Wisdom enlivens the person who partakes of it. Conversely, Foolishness offers food and drink that sicken the body.

Pray: Thank God for the many opportunities placed before you each day, and pray that you will make choices that will lead to the fulfillment brought by wisdom rather than the destruction brought by folly.

Act: Think before you decide on a matter. Don't simply choose what appears to be most appealing.

Wisdom's Feast

Read Proverbs 10

The entire book of Proverbs is a collection of collections of wise sayings. The first identifiable collection is called the Proverbs of Solomon. It consists of two-line proverbs characterized by antithetic parallelism (the thought of the first line is expressed in contrast in the second line). The primary contrast in this first chapter is between the wise person and the fool.

Reflect: Upon reflection, we will have to admit that the state in which we find ourselves is frequently the consequence of the decisions we have made. In other words, to a large extent, we determine our own good or bad fortune.

Pray: As you stand before God in prayer, you must take responsibility for many of the circumstances of your life.

Act: If you are not happy with the way your life is unfolding, do what you can to change your behavior.

Read Proverbs 11

Though all antithetic proverbs contrast the lot of the righteous with that of the wicked, the proverbs in this chapter seem to concentrate on various forms of honesty and dishonesty, along with their social consequences. These proverbs remind us that we do not live in isolation from other people.

Reflect: Those who live in a society that promotes individualism may forget that the consequences of their actions affect other people as well as themselves. Sometimes our personal decisions enrich others, and sometimes they impoverish them. We must take our share of responsibility for the general state of society.

Pray: Enlarge the scope of your prayer. Don't just pray for yourself and your loved ones, but include the concerns of people whom you may not know but who are also affected by your decisions.

Act: Be conscious of the consequences of your actions today in the lives of others.

Read Proverbs 12

Many of the proverbs in this chapter have to do with some aspect of speech. They counsel us to speak honestly, to guard our words lest we harm others with what we say, to avoid endless and thoughtless gossip, and to be cautious in accepting the words of others.

Reflect: We may not always be aware of the power that our words possess. In many ways our words may be more influential than our actions. Our words present a picture of ourselves, of others, or of some aspect of the world. For this reason, our words should always be truthful and sincere, building up rather than tearing down.

Pray: Ask God for the insight to perceive circumstances as they really are and for the integrity to represent them honestly.

Act: Examine your manner of speech. Do your words really convey the truth as you see it?

In this chapter, the contrast between wealth and poverty is a prominent theme. It is a variation on the theme of retribution, namely, that the good or wise person will experience good fortune, while misfortune will befall the wicked or fool. The lot of both is contrasted in the antithetic parallelism of the proverbs.

Reflect: The applicability of the theory of retribution, though found in much of our theology, both traditional and contemporary, is still questioned today. It may not always serve as an adequate explanation for one's lot in life, but it certainly can function as an incentive to righteous living.

Pray: Trust that you will experience the providence of God, and that you will be able to enjoy what you need to live a life of integrity and peace.

Act: Be grateful for the prosperity that you enjoy and share it with those less fortunate.

Read Proverbs 14

Inner dispositions are what distinguish the wise person from the fool. They might be dispositions of heart or attitudes of the mind. The wise person is one who fears the Lord, while the fool is sometimes arrogant. The wise person is sometimes called shrewd; the fool is often reckless.

Reflect: The wise person is the one who fears the Lord. Fear of the Lord is more an attitude of reverence and respect than one of dread and terror. It recognizes the holiness and might of God and the insignificance of human beings. It is what makes a wise person humble. It is the foremost mark of wisdom.

Pray: Praise God for the divine power and might that you detect in the world and for God's graciousness reflected in the lives of others.

Act: Spend time with and learn from someone you consider truly wise.

Read Proverbs 15

This last collection of antithetic comparisons includes various proverbs that contrast the behavior of the wise with that of the foolish. In several places this wisdom language is replaced by language that contains moral judgment: righteous versus wicked. The notion of "path" or "way," another much-used wisdom concept, is also found. It suggests that there are only two possible courses of action, that of the wise/righteous or that of the foolish/wicked.

Reflect: Though wisdom classifications are generally accurate descriptions of human behavior, we must allow for exceptions. It has been said that wise/righteous people do sometimes make mistakes, and on occasion foolish/wicked people act honorably.

Pray: Pray for the grace to develop habits of behavior that will lead you along the path of wisdom and righteousness.

Act: When faced with important decisions, take time to weigh all of the circumstances so that you might make the best choice possible.

Though wisdom is gleaned from reflection on human experience, direction for right behavior is often provided by the religious tradition. Many proverbs in this chapter describe the role played by the Lord. Other proverbs emphasize the importance of respect for political authority (the king).

Reflect: Wisdom is insight into and conformity to the workings of the world. The wise person learns to live in accord with the way God created the world and in accord with the rules and customs of society. The goal of most proverbs is some form of social harmony.

Pray: Thank God for your timetested religious tradition, which provides direction for finding peace and fulfillment in life.

Act: Reflect on the tenets of your religious tradition, not as restrictions but as sign posts that direct you along the path of life and warn you of possible obstacles on the way.

PROVERBS 17 988

Read Proverbs 17

This chapter contains, in addition to proverbs that warn against greed and dishonesty, several sayings describing proper family behavior. Well-behaved children and grandchildren are evidence of good parenting and enhance the honor in which elders are esteemed. Conversely, undisciplined children bring shame to the family.

Reflect: The stress on good behavior reflects ancient Israel's concern for matters that touch on honor and shame. In a society like that of Israel, which was grouprather than individual-oriented, a person's status in the community was very important. Behavior of members of one's family could threaten that status.

Pray: When you stand before God in prayer, remember that, while you are a unique individual, you are also a member of a family. Thank God for the members of your family, pray for them, and be conscious of your familial obligations.

Act: Make an effort today to reach out with love and concern to your family.

Read Proverbs 18

Proper speech is a major theme of this chapter. The words of a fool are deceitful and ruinous, provoke strife and bring shame, while the wise person calls on the name of the Lord. Other proverbs underscore the assurance one finds in a loyal brother, a faithful friend, and a loving wife.

Reflect: Once again the proverbs describe the blessings of social harmony. The unqualified order in life as described in Proverbs suggests that this book reflects the life of the comfortable, those for whom the dynamics of society appear to work. There is no prophetic challenge in this tradition.

Pray: Thank God for the peace and security that you enjoy, and remember that there are many wise and righteous people who struggle without peace and experience great insecurity.

Act: What might you do to further a sense of peace and security for others?

PROVERBS **19** 990

Read Proverbs 19

These proverbs concentrate on two major themes: the role played by money, and the importance of discipline. While money is usually seen as evidence of wise living, a poor man's integrity is considered of greater value. Furthermore, money can also generate false friends. The need to be corrected when in error is also stressed.

Reflect: Money can affect us in opposing ways. It can be the fruit of wise decisions, but it can also be gained in dishonest ways. Money and the power that often comes with it can also attract fair-weather friends. It is clear that with money comes responsibility to use it in ways that benefit others as well.

Pray: Thank God for the prosperity that you enjoy, realizing that much of it is really the fruit of the industry of those who have gone before you.

Act: Be generous with what you have.

- 6 Many seek the favor of the generous, and everyone is a friend to a giver of gifts.
- 7 If the poor are hated even by their kin, how much more are they shunned by their friends!

When they call after them, they are not there.^a

- 8 To get wisdom is to love oneself; to keep understanding is to prosper.

Read Proverbs 20

This collection of diverse proverbs contains several powerful metaphors. Among them we find anger of a king compared to the growling of a lion, the intention of the human mind likened to deep water, wise speech said to be precious like gold, and the wicked compared to chaff that is winnowed.

Reflect: The metaphors used in these proverbs are all taken from material creation, showing that knowledge of the natural world can provide insight into human behavior. This exemplifies the ancient belief that natural creation and human behavior are governed by the same laws established in the beginning by God.

Pray: Pray Psalm 8 slowly and thoughtfully, giving praise to God for the marvels of creation, particularly for the wonders of humankind.

Act: Spend some time reflecting on the natural world—the movement of clouds or the flight of birds. What might they tell you of God?

Wine is a mocker, strong drink a brawler, and whoever is led astray by it is not wise.

² The dread anger of a king is like the growling of a lion;

anyone who provokes him to anger forfeits life itself.

Read Proverbs 21

The fate of the wicked is addressed by most of the proverbs in this chapter. They denounce haughty eyes and a proud heart, a lying tongue, oppressive and crooked ways, arrogance, disregard for the poor, inordinate love of pleasure, sloth, false witness, and a brazen attitude. Such behavior is contrasted with fidelity to the ways of the Lord.

Reflect: Much of the behavior condemned by the sages is not only accepted but also encouraged by some of the standards of today's society. Such standards suggest that any means that will advance one's desires should be pursued, regardless of the morality of those means.

Pray: Ask God for the courage to be faithful to religious principles even when these principles are disregarded or even scorned by others.

Act: Act with integrity in less significant matters so that you will have the strength of character to be faithful in more important matters. **21** The king's heart is a stream of water in the hand of the LORD;

he turns it wherever he will.

PROVERBS 22 994

Read Proverbs 22:1-16

Status in society is again addressed. One's reputation is dependent on one's ability to conform to the standards of society. The importance of training and discipline is stressed. A humble attitude and concern for others characterize the wise person. The role played by the Lord in all of this is emphasized.

Reflect: These proverbs may appear to be somewhat repetitious, but we should perceive them as snapshots that capture a single moment of truth, not every aspect of it. It is only by looking at a person or an object from several points of view that one can approach a more accurate understanding. In like manner, a number of proverbs that offer various points of view provide fuller understanding.

Pray: Ask forgiveness for the times your selfish choices have caused hardship for yourself or for others.

Act: How might you be more faithful to your social responsibilities?

Read Proverbs 22:17—24:22

This collection, entitled "Sayings of the Wise," resembles an ancient Egyptian document, *Instruction of Amenenope*. The biblical collection opens with a characteristic exhortation to listen ("Incline your ear"). The proverbs themselves direct the student to listen to instruction, to live peaceably with others, to be prudent in business matters, and to be faithful to social and religious obligations.

Reflect: Though religious doctrine may differ from faith to faith, advice for successful living is remarkably the same across social and religious cultures. Everyone must learn the customs of the group and decide whether or not to conform to them; and everyone learns that there are consequences for one's decisions. The similarities highlight common human concerns.

Pray: Pray for people who hold religious traditions that differ from yours. Realize that they are searching for truth in their own ways.

Act: Try to learn something about another faith tradition.

This short collection of "Further Sayings of the Wise" contains a new theme, the place of honest work. Mention of the field, thorns, nettles, vineyard, and a stone wall are evidence of an agrarian society.

Reflect: The metaphors of farming or growing grapes characterize conscientious living of life. In such occupations, the fruits of one's labor are immediately obvious. The need for planning, diligence, and patience are clear. As the final saying (vv. 33–34) states, there is no time for inopportune sleep or slumber.

Pray: Trust in God that the efforts you put into living with honesty and commitment will reap the kind of fruits for which you hope. God does not promise that he will intervene to guarantee these hoped-for rewards, but he gives us this hope to strengthen our trust that all of life is under God's guidance and purpose.

Act: Resolve to do something today with extraordinary diligence.

PROVERBS 25 998

Read Proverbs 25

This Second Solomonic Collection is attributed to the men of the court of King Hezekiah. Though many of these proverbs are typical two-line sayings, others are several lines long. There is heavy use of nature imagery here, and many of the proverbs highlight the importance of the king.

Reflect: The Israelites believed that their kings possessed wisdom that flowed from a special relationship with God. Furthermore, political authority was not intended for the individual aggrandizement of the ruler. Rather, such authority carried serious social responsibility.

Pray: Ask God for the insight to choose leaders who will govern with wisdom and impartiality rather than those interested in advancing their own causes.

Act: As a citizen, you have the responsibility of learning about the political issues of the day and discovering the positions held on these issues by those seeking public office.

5 take away the wicked from the presence of the king.

and his throne will be established in righteousness.

- 6 Do not put yourself forward in the king's presence or stand in the place of the great;
- for it is better to be told, "Come up here," than to be put lower in the presence of a noble.

What your eyes have seen

do not hastily bring into court; for what will you do in the end,

when your neighbor puts you to shame?

- 9 Argue your case with your neighbor directly, and do not disclose another's secret;
- or else someone who hears you will bring shame upon you, and your ill repute will have no end.
- ¹¹ A word fitly spoken

Read Proverbs 26

These proverbs describe the illadvised behavior of the fool, the sluggard, the deceiver, and the talebearer. The consequences that flow from such behavior reflect the theory of retribution: wise or good action brings happiness, while misfortune befalls those who engage in foolish or wicked behavior.

Reflect: So often we fail to consider the consequences of our actions, looking only to the pleasure we think we will derive from them. These proverbs can serve as a warning for the wise person, for they describe the consequences of ill-advised behavior and demonstrate that only a fool would choose to act in such ways.

Pray: Ask God for the patience needed to examine carefully the foreseeable consequences of a course of action and for the fortitude to act accordingly.

Act: Do something today that will genuinely enrich your life and the lives of others.

26 Like snow in summer or rain in harvest, so honor is not fitting for a fool.

² Like a sparrow in its flitting, like a swallow in its flying,

an undeserved curse goes nowhere.

- ³ A whip for the horse, a bridle for the donkey, and a rod for the back of fools.
- Do not answer fools according to their folly, or you will be a fool yourself.
- 5 Answer fools according to their folly, or they will be wise in their own eyes.
- 6 It is like cutting off one's foot and drinking down violence,

to send a message by a fool.

- 7 The legs of a disabled person hang limp; so does a proverb in the mouth of a fool.

PROVERBS **26** 1000

Read Proverbs 27

This chapter contains various kinds of proverbs. Besides using parallelism and poetic imagery, a few of the proverbs compare the merits of one aspect of reality to another. These sayings are referred to as "better than" proverbs. For example: "Better is open rebuke than hidden love" (v. 5).

Reflect: As is the case with all proverbs, "better than" sayings call us to careful reflection on some aspect of life and a subsequent decision to action. This is the way we gain empirical wisdom. Unlike those proverbs that contrast good or wise with aberrant or foolish behavior, "better than" sayings presume that both aspects are somehow good. Deciding between them requires astute judgment.

Pray: Ask God for the insight needed to recognize what is good, and to choose what is "better."

Act: Spend time today evaluating your manner of acting. Might there be a better way of acting?

- 27 Do not boast about tomorrow, for you do not know what a day may bring.
 - ² Let another praise you, and not your own mouth a stranger, and not your own lips.
 - ³ A stone is heavy, and sand is weighty, but a fool's provocation is heavier than both.
 - Wrath is cruel, anger is overwhelming, but who is able to stand before jealousy?
 - ⁵ Better is open rebuke than hidden love.
 - Well meant are the wounds a friend inflicts, but profuse are the kisses of an enemy.
 - ⁷ The sated appetite spurns honey, but to a ravenous appetite even the bitter is sweet.
 - 8 Like a bird that strays from its nest is one who strays from home.
 - 9 Perfume and incense make the heart glad, but the soul is torn by trouble.^c
 - Do not forsake your friend or the friend of your parent;

do not go to the house of your kindred in the day of your calamity.

Better is a neighbor who is nearby than kindred who are far away.

- Be wise, my child, and make my heart glad, so that I may answer whoever reproaches me.

PROVERBS **28** 1002

Read Proverbs 28

Ancient Israel viewed wealth in various ways. Material comfort was considered the consequence of wise or righteous behavior, and the lack of prosperity the result of frivolous living. Still, the wealthy were prohibited from taking advantage of others and were required to look out for the best interests of those less fortunate.

Reflect: Since wisdom had to do with social harmony, it is understandable that those who enjoyed good fortune were expected to share it with those who did not have it. Extreme material disparity is often the cause of great social unrest. The wise person knows that care for those who are needy transcends strict justice.

Pray: As you stand before God in prayer, bring with you people who are in great need. Open your heart to their concerns as well as your own.

Act: Let your fervent prayer be grounded in concrete acts of justice.

- When the righteous triumph, there is great glory, but when the wicked prevail, people go into hiding.
- No one who conceals transgressions will prosper, but one who confesses and forsakes them will obtain mercy.
- Happy is the one who is never without fear, but one who is hard-hearted will fall into calamity.
- Like a roaring lion or a charging bear is a wicked ruler over a poor people.
- 16 A ruler who lacks understanding is a cruel oppressor;
 - but one who hates unjust gain will enjoy a long life.
- 17 If someone is burdened with the blood of another,
 - let that killer be a fugitive until death; let no one offer assistance.
- One who walks in integrity will be safe, but whoever follows crooked ways will fall into the Pit.^a
- 19 Anyone who tills the land will have plenty of bread,
 - but one who follows worthless pursuits will have plenty of poverty.
- The faithful will abound with blessings, but one who is in a hurry to be rich will not go unpunished.
- 21 To show partiality is not good yet for a piece of bread a person may do wrong.
- ²² The miser is in a hurry to get rich and does not know that loss is sure to come.
- ²³ Whoever rebukes a person will afterward find more favor
 - than one who flatters with the tongue.

- The greedy person stirs up strife, but whoever trusts in the LORD will be enriched.
- Those who trust in their own wits are fools; but those who walk in wisdom come through safely.
- Whoever gives to the poor will lack nothing, but one who turns a blind eye will get many a curse.
- ²⁸ When the wicked prevail, people go into hiding; but when they perish, the righteous increase.

Read Proverbs 29

The need for divine guidance is well stated in this chapter: "Where there is no prophecy, the people cast off restraint [are without direction]" (v. 18). The role that religious tradition plays in the search for true wisdom is acknowledged. It is the Lord who enlightens (v. 13), who makes us safe (v. 25)

Reflect: While it is true that wisdom is gleaned from reflection on life experience (as described in the proverbs of this chapter), our religious tradition provides us with well-tested guidance in our search for meaning. The law is not restrictive, as some think. Rather, it sets our feet on the right path.

Pray: Thank God for the direction set for us by our religious tradition, and ask for the grace to follow that path.

Act: What are some of the major principles that this biblical book has to teach you?

29 One who is often reproved, yet remains stubborn,

will suddenly be broken beyond healing.

² When the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice;

but when the wicked rule, the people groan.

- 3 A child who loves wisdom makes a parent glad, but to keep company with prostitutes is to squander one's substance.

PROVERBS **29** 1004

Read Proverbs 30

This chapter consists of a collection of proverbs attributed to Agur, an unknown non-Israelite sage, as well as examples of the numerical proverb. Agur's instructions are similar to those found in other places in the book. The numerical sayings follow the x+1 form ("two things... three...; three things... four..."). They have the character of a riddle.

Reflect: There are many different ways of learning. The insights of other traditions constitute one such avenue. Informing ourselves of the content of such traditions will not only enlighten us as to the value of that other tradition, but may also shed new light on our own behavior.

Pray: Praise God for the many ways in which people come to know God and for the wisdom they discover in their search for ultimate meaning.

Act: Open yourself to the possibility of God speaking to you through the traditions and insights of people of other cultures.

Sayings of Agur

30^{The words of Agur son of Jakeh. An oracle.}

Thus says the man: I am weary, O God, I am weary, O God. How can I prevail?c

PROVERBS **31** 1006

Read Proverbs 31

Women hold an important place in this chapter. It opens with instruction for judicious governing intended for King Lemuel as put forward by his mother. The second part of the chapter is a poem describing the ideal patriarchal wife.

Reflect: Though these female characterizations reflect the gender biases of the culture of the author, they are significant nonetheless. In a book that purports to offer direction for wise living, this queenmother is presented as one whose astute advice should be followed, and the ideal wife is offered as a model of wisdom to be emulated.

Pray: Thank God for the wise women in your life who have offered advice and counsel and whose behavior sets a standard to be followed in your own life.

Act: Make it a point to thank the wise women you know for the many ways in which they have enriched your life.

- ⁶ Give strong drink to one who is perishing, and wine to those in bitter distress;
- 7 let them drink and forget their poverty, and remember their misery no more.
- 8 Speak out for those who cannot speak, for the rights of all the destitute.^a
- ⁹ Speak out, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy.

Ode to a Capable Wife

- A capable wife who can find? She is far more precious than jewels.
- 11 The heart of her husband trusts in her, and he will have no lack of gain.
- 12 She does him good, and not harm, all the days of her life.
- ¹³ She seeks wool and flax, and works with willing hands.
- She is like the ships of the merchant, she brings her food from far away.
- She rises while it is still night and provides food for her household and tasks for her servant-girls.
- 16 She considers a field and buys it; with the fruit of her hands she plants a vineyard.
- ¹⁷ She girds herself with strength, and makes her arms strong.
- ¹⁸ She perceives that her merchandise is profitable. Her lamp does not go out at night.
- She puts her hands to the distaff, and her hands hold the spindle.
- ²⁰ She opens her hand to the poor, and reaches out her hands to the needy.
- ²¹ She is not afraid for her household when it snows, for all her household are clothed in crimson.
- She makes herself coverings; her clothing is fine linen and purple.
- 23 Her husband is known in the city gates, taking his seat among the elders of the land.
- ²⁴ She makes linen garments and sells them; she supplies the merchant with sashes.
- ²⁵ Strength and dignity are her clothing, and she laughs at the time to come.
- She opens her mouth with wisdom, and the teaching of kindness is on her tongue.
- ²⁷ She looks well to the ways of her household, and does not eat the bread of idleness.
- ²⁸ Her children rise up and call her happy; her husband too, and he praises her:
- ²⁹ "Many women have done excellently, but you surpass them all."

Charm is deceitful, and beauty is vain, but a woman who fears the LORD is to be praised. Give her a share in the fruit of her hands, and let her works praise her in the city gates.
