

Read Nahum 1:1-8

This book concerns the overthrow and destruction of Israel's longtime mortal enemy, Assyria, whose capital city is Nineveh. To save the Israelites, the Lord marches forth as a fearsome warrior against those who have harshly oppressed Israel for almost two centuries. God's defeat of Israel's enemies reveals concretely that "the LORD is good, a stronghold in a day of trouble."

Reflect: God's reputation as a defender of the oppressed goes back to the days of Israel's enslavement in Egypt and their deliverance at the Red Sea. Can I see God's saving hand at work in my life or in today's world? How should God's people respond to injustice and oppression?

Pray: I will pray for eyes to see injustice and the courage to confront it.

Act: I will read and listen to the local news to acquaint myself with the injustice at my doorstep.

The Consuming Wrath of God

- A jealous and avenging God is the LORD, the LORD is avenging and wrathful; the LORD takes vengeance on his adversaries and rages against his enemies.
- The LORD is slow to anger but great in power, and the LORD will by no means clear the guilty.

His way is in whirlwind and storm, and the clouds are the dust of his feet.

- 4 He rebukes the sea and makes it dry, and he dries up all the rivers; Bashan and Carmel wither, and the bloom of Lebanon fades.
- 5 The mountains quake before him, and the hills melt; the earth heaves before him, the world and all who live in it.

NAHUM **1** 1494

Read Nahum 1:9-15

The prophet addresses Nineveh directly and reveals that the Assyrians' military campaigns against Israel are really attacks against the Lord. God will respond and cut off the Assyrians. The proper response from God's people is to fulfill their vows and to keep their holy festivals honoring God. Worship has its roots in gratitude for God's saving deeds.

Reflect: I often pray when I am in need. When prayers are answered or when I recognize that God has helped me, what is my response? Is my prayer mostly petition or do I spend sufficient time in thanksgiving?

Pray: I will pray for the grace to recognize God's blessing and for a spirit of gratitude.

Act: Today I will set aside some time to list the blessings God has given me.

He will make a full end of his adversaries, a and will pursue his enemies into darkness.

Good News for Judah

- Look! On the mountains the feet of one who brings good tidings, who proclaims peace!
 Celebrate your festivals, O Judah, fulfill your vows,
 for never again shall the wicked invade you; they are utterly cut off.

Read Nahum 2

This chapter describes the attack against Nineveh, its futile defense, and its sacking. The mighty Assyrian army is no match for the Lord, who uses the Babylonian army to attack Nineveh. Now the people who conquered and subjected others shall themselves be conquered and subjected. The prophet relishes the defeat of Assyria, as would anyone who has suffered under an unjust aggressor.

Reflect: The human misery of war is captured in such images as that of a population fleeing the city like water being drained from a pool and young women being led into exile, beating their breasts in mourning. War is not just a conflict between armies but a tragedy that affects non-combatants, especially the vulnerable who often have no defense or escape.

Pray: Today I will pray for refugees and victims of war.

Act: I will try to restore peace to a relationship that is broken or wounded.

NAHUM **3** 1496

Read Nahum 3

With graphic language, the prophet details the atrocities of Assyria, making clear that their fate is well deserved. Beyond the carnage of war, Assyria is guilty of pride, thinking itself better than all others and beyond the reach of any enemy. The king and nobles are so complacent in their power that they are like those who sleep. They shall awaken to destruction.

Reflect: The fate of Nineveh dramatizes the proverb, "you reap whatever you sow" (see Gal 6:7). Violence begets violence, war begets war. What is true on the stage of world events is true also in our own lives. How we treat others invites them to treat us in the same way, for good or for ill.

Pray: I will pray for the grace of humility in my dealings with others.

Act: I will treat others with the respect and dignity with which I would like to be treated.
